Both educational & private visiting groups of adults & children use the camping areas to sleep in tents/cook using open fires & other leisure/recreation type activities	 Camp Fire Shelters There is a risk that the camp fire shelter construction could become unstable in severe weather conditions. → There is a risk of tripping or walking into the ropes securing the fire shelters 	Camp Fire Shelters All shelters are constructed by a competent, trained WHCC staff & double checked for stability after a couple of days once erected and then on a regular basis, especially after severe weather condition such as strong wind. → After any severe weather all shelters are checked as a matter of course. → Wherever possible the structure should be made a permanent fixture into the ground without the need for ropes	



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Vehicles → Vehicles moving on the camp sites and across the estate pose a hazard to visitors	 → No structure should have a ropes obstructing the entrance or egress → Party leader supervision → All groups are told that entrance and egress from camp shelter areas are from either end where there are no ropes. Vehicles → All site owned vehicles to have a flashing yellow/orange hazard light fitted – to be running whenever vehicle is in motion → Visitor's vehicles are only allowed on the camping fields for loading or unloading → 5 mph speed limit on the estate – signs present on main drive &within the information pack given to each group leader.

	Fire	→ Margins of long vegetation kept beneath wooded areas/trees to keep tents away from drip line
